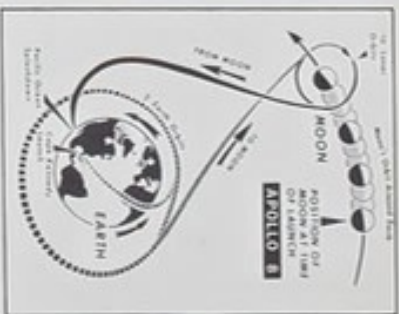

Through many changes over the years the program at Regina Cleri has developed into the important effective role that it now plays in our lives.



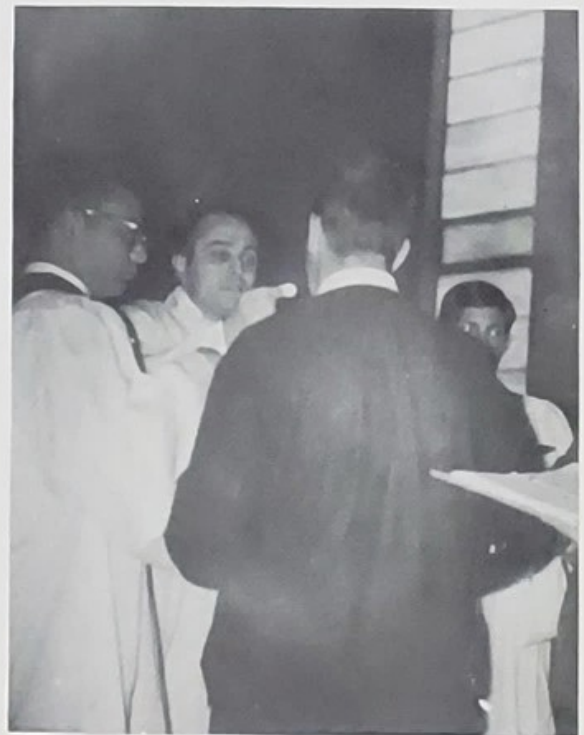


The Central Act Of Our Worship: Mass

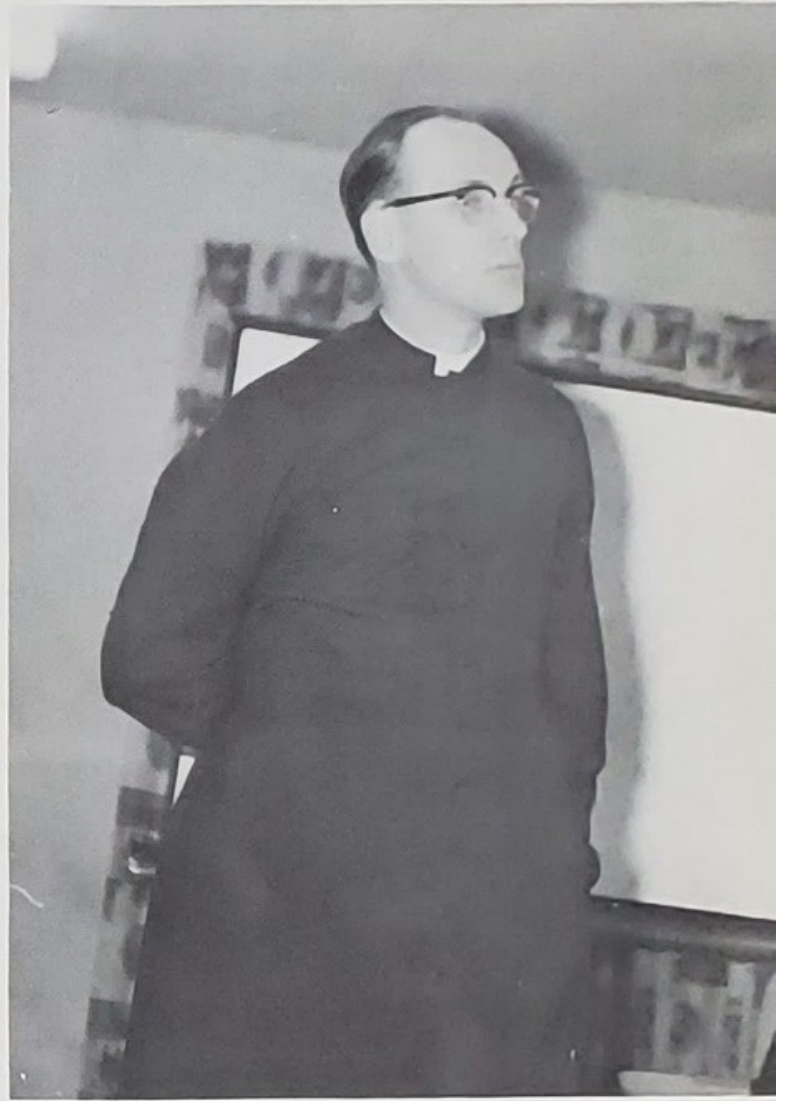

Father Alphonse Hoernig

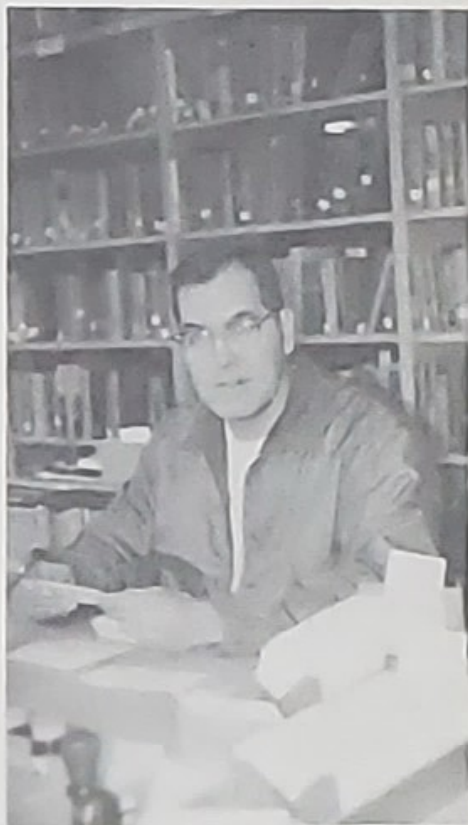

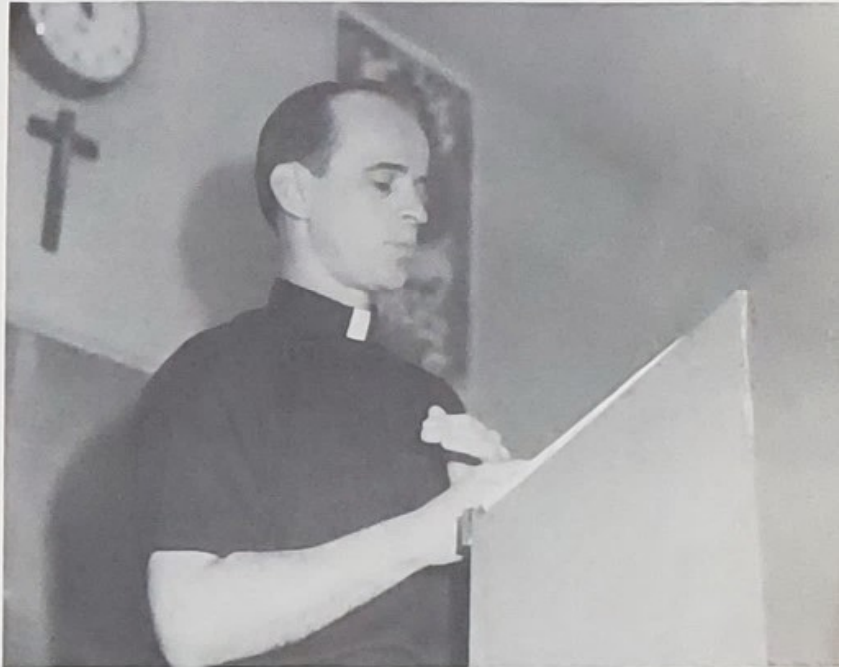

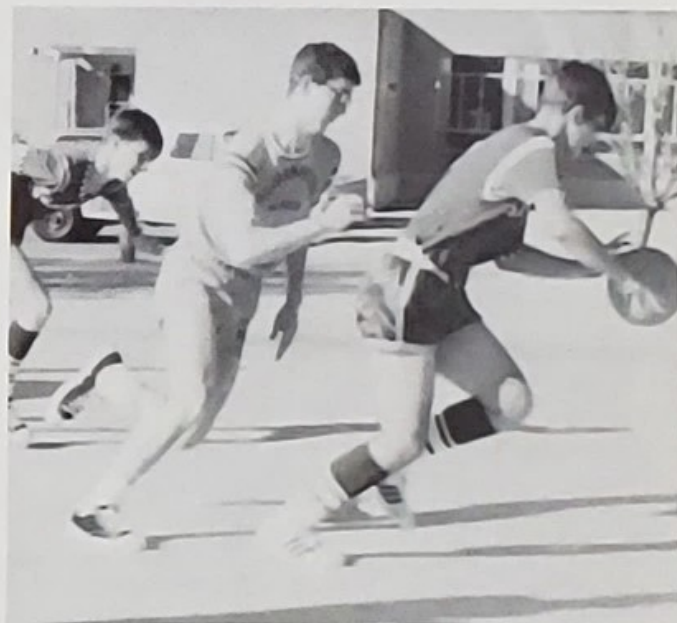
Change In Body

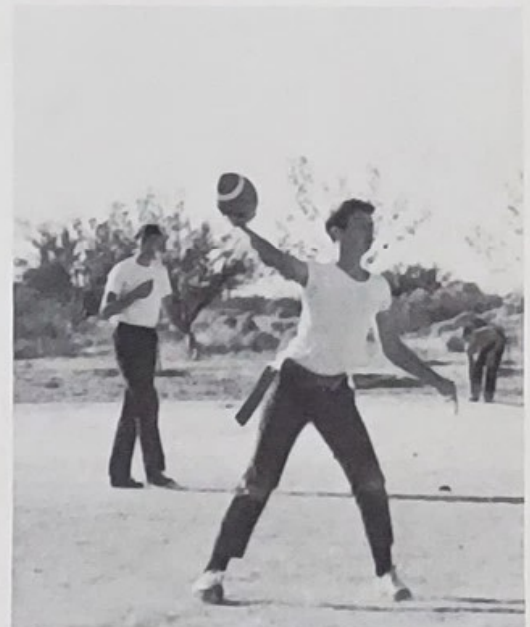

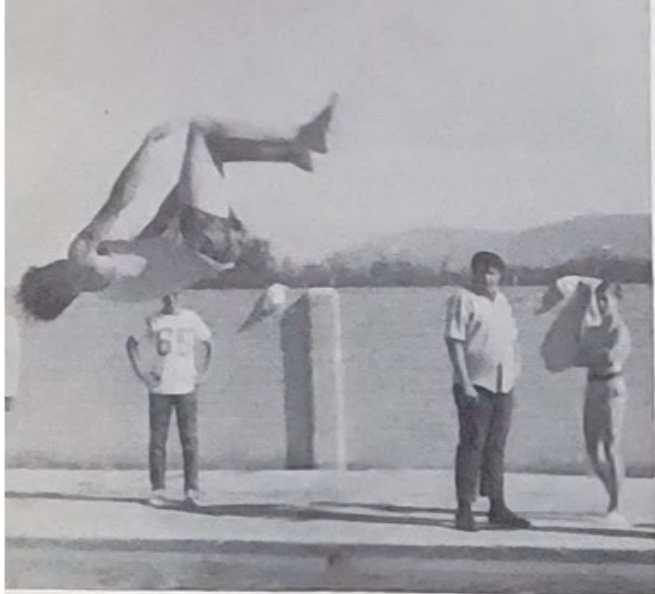

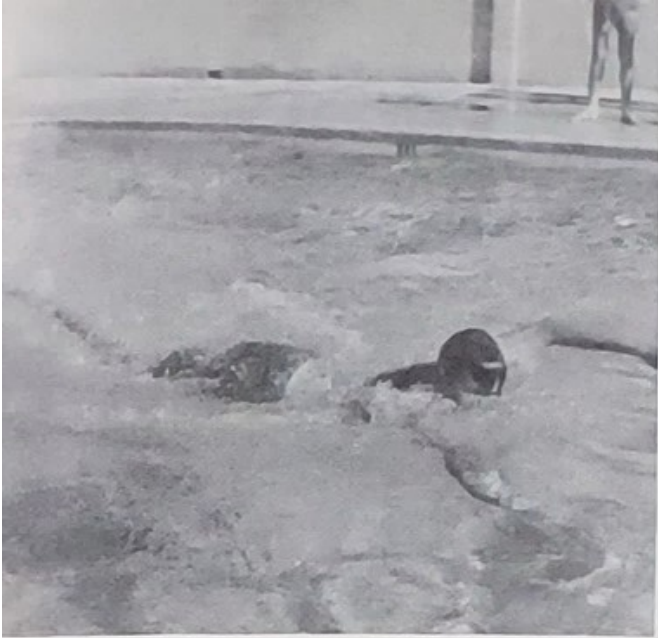

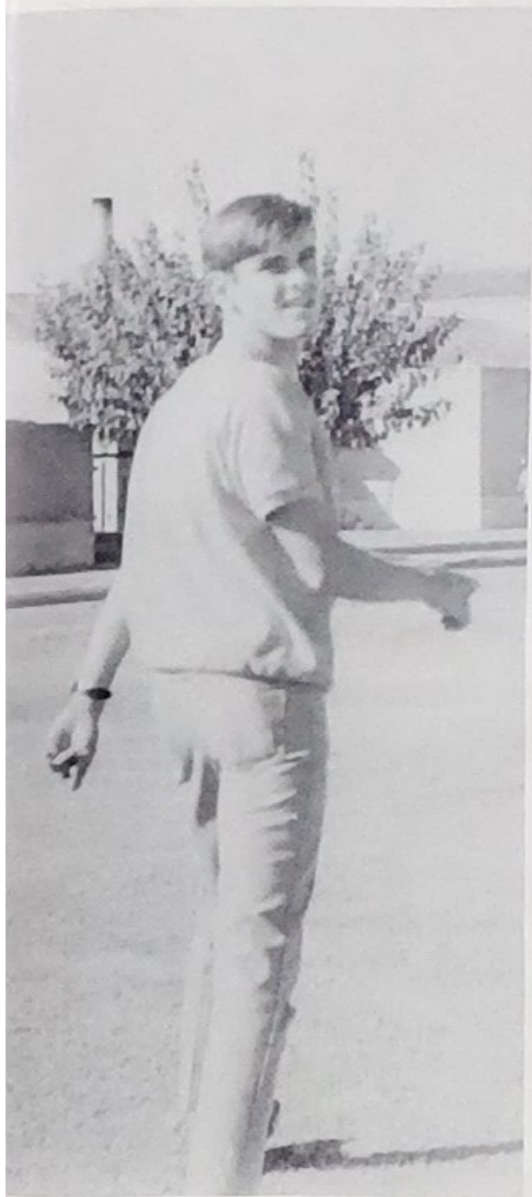




Change Of Actions

INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

1. Martha Vassacostas, representing Brazil, was crowned Miss Universe 1964 at the Miss Universe Beauty Pageant in Miami Beach, Florida.
2. Pope Paul VI salutes hands with Dr. Christian Barnard during a private audience at the Vatican. The pontiff congratulated the surgeon on his work in heart-transplant operations.
3. Inauguration. Quaxos and her husband, Greek shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis, leave chapel on the Greek island of Saronis after their marriage October 20th.
4. In May the Paris Peace talks began in an effort to stop the Vietnam conflict. French Presidency Francois Charles de Gaulle indicated talks for the North Vietnamese representatives and for the U.S. representatives, headed by Averell Harriman, seemed from light.
5. A defiant Czech youth wears a national flag under the gun barrel of a Soviet tank in Prague. This Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia occurred in August.
6. U.S. Marines raise the flag from a mountain top in a landing zone about 27 miles southwest of Da Nang, South Vietnam.
7. Mexico got Jhonita Euzengola Blandi runs up the stairs of Olympic stadium in Mexico City with the Olympic flame to crown the opening ceremony.
8. The U.S. was not the only nation to feel the effects of rebellion youth. Here a crowd of students join the '68 October in being demanding educational reforms.
