





Rev. Francis J. Murphy, C.M. 1902-1970

Father Francis J. Murphy, C.M., was born in Chicago in 1902 to Michael and Margaret Mott Murphy. He was educated in Chicago and attended St. Vincent's College and the Vincentian Preparatory Seminary in Cape Girardeau, Missouri. Father took his perpetual vows in the Congregation of the Mission on May 28, 1923, and was ordained May 29, 1930, at St. Mary's Seminary in Perryville, Missouri. Father Murphy died on June 30, 1970, after spending a total of forty years in Christ's vineyard. He spent his last two years teaching English Literature here at Regina Cleri Seminary.

We, the staff of the 1971 CROWN, dedicate our yearbook to the memory of Father Murphy— a great man, a great priest, and above all, a great friend to all who knew him. As our rector, Father Hoernig, C.M., said of him at his funeral Mass, "Father Murphy was a man who loved life, and who did everything possible to help others love it too. His zest for living was equalled by his zeal for the work of the priesthood. I will remember Father Frank as a happy man, as a dedicated priest, and fellow Vincentian Father."

Those of us who were lucky enough to have been able to know Father during his last two years, are left with a powerful impression. He was a




deeply religious man totally caught up with his God and with his work in the daily trials of life. A very candid man, if he believed something, he believed it, and wouldn't be afraid to come out and tell you exactly what he thought. He was a "Tell it like it is" priest who would never beat around the bush.

Perhaps the reason that students liked him so much was that Father Murphy was never old. Whether he was chasing roadrunners with his sicycle, spending a pleasant afternoon at his favorite gym, or taking us or a little snack at "yon pizzaria," he was always a youngster at heart.

Father was very close to the students and could read the "pulse" of the student body very easily. Students were always welcome to come up to his room to discuss a problem, gripe, or just "rap." Mr. Edward Henderson, a former teacher at R.C.S., owes the fact that he is now studying to become a priest, to the influence of Father's personable counseling and friendship.

With Father's death, we have experienced the loss of a great friend, but one thing's for sure, he must be making heaven a lot more lively.


When I was first told that I would be given the chance to express myself in the '71 CROWN, I was really looking forward to "telling it like it is". Now, I'm not so sure.

So now, though my grades may still be C's and D's, I will have learned in four short years, something that takes some people a lifetime to understand.




Brian John Willis

I have often tried to make it a point in my life never to become discouraged, and just as often I've failed. However, there have been times when I accomplished much, or did more than I was capable of doing.





Social Studies---






Since our American society is the result of the struggles and yearnings of many peoples, world history became a very valuable course. The freshmen studied the development of society from the Romans to the direct causes of the World Wars. Father Shine comprehensively taught them many of the basic influences which ancient history has had on our society. 



Father Gattes and Mr. Roy, a teacher at nearby Palo Verde High School, shared the load of professing English this year. They both managed to blend into their classes literature, grammar and composition. Father Gattes, one of our most popular professors, instructed the freshmen and sophomores in the basic fundamentals of the English language, especially vocabulary, grammar and writing style.

Mr. Roy's class of juniors concerned themselves with such authors as Robert Frost, Nathaniel Hawthorne and Emily Dickinson, whose classic works are prime examples of American literature. In the fourth year English with Mr. Roy, the seniors concentrated on the works of Geoffrey Chaucer and William Shakespeare, as well as many other influential writers in English history. Both classes investigated not only the writings themselves but also how the people of the times lived and the manner in which they reacted to such writings.

Latin





Mathematics -

Father Derbes was once again the "Master of Numbers." First year students were confronted with the basics of algebra. The sophomores studied the geometric laws and properties of the world around us. A third class consisted of juniors and seniors who delved more deeply into algebra, developing a firm foundation for all sciences that employ mathematical concepts.

In all classes, Father Derbes tried to give us as wide an exposure to the subject as possible, by bringing in special aids and outside matter, such as problems in logic and periodicals dealing with mathematics. Briefly, Father made math come alive.

Physics—A Study Of God Through Nature








Mr. Valencia, another new addition to our faculty, taught the juniors and seniors the language of the Spanish people. A man very enthusiastic about his own heritage, Mr. Valencia brought Mexican atmosphere to the classroom. an authentic essence of his modern method of teaching was in the fact that he used not a book but real life situations involving Spanish dialogues. These dialogues were simulated through the use of four triangles. Each triangle made up a different set of characters who talked to each other and asked each other questions. Thus the student was forced to put into use such grammar as pronouns, verb endings, etc. As the course progressed, new tenses and topics were used. This method has proven to be very successful both here and at Cholla High School, where Mr. Valencia is also currently teaching. Communication between the clergy and the Spanish speaking people is a very important factor if we are to follow Christ's command to spread the faith throughout all nations.


Mr. Edward Henderson

In Memoriam



Father Terence Sheridan 1923-1970

It began in Oldcastle County, Meath, Ireland on June 21, 1923 and it ended on All Souls Day, 1970. It is a remarkable story. A few of us witnessed it in its entirety. Most of just saw a little bit here and there. Yet it was such a profound story that even that little bit will stay with us as long as we live. It is the story of Father Terence Sheridan.

Today it would be considered a short story, 47 years in length. It began with his birth in Ireland in 1923. He spent his years in preparation for the priesthood at St. Patrick's College in Carlow, Ireland, and was ordained a priest of God in 1947 by Bishop Thomas Keough. The major part of his ministry was spent at Sacred Heart Parish in Nogales, Arizona. He was appointed pastor of St. Pius X in 1969, but was replaced by Monsignor Robert Fuller when he became ill only two months after his appointment.

He spent a good part of last spring here at Regina Cleri, resting and recuperating from surgery. He had a smile for everyone at all times, despite the pain he was enduring. This was a short chapter in his story. But we here at the seminary learned a lot from him. He was not just a regular priest. He was our friend and the epitome of the priesthood which we are now striving for.

The epilogue of Father Sheridan's story was a sorrowful one. The weeks and months of suffering were surpassed only by his courage and happy heart which he shared with those who visited him. His entire life was spent in teaching others. Even in death he continued to instruct us with this great courage and will to live which he imparted to us.

As far as we are concerned, Father Sheridan's story is over. God has work for him to do in heaven. But his story is read and re-read by those who met him. No doubt he is still adding to his story in heaven. And we can be just as sure that his Creator is proud of his masterpiece.
