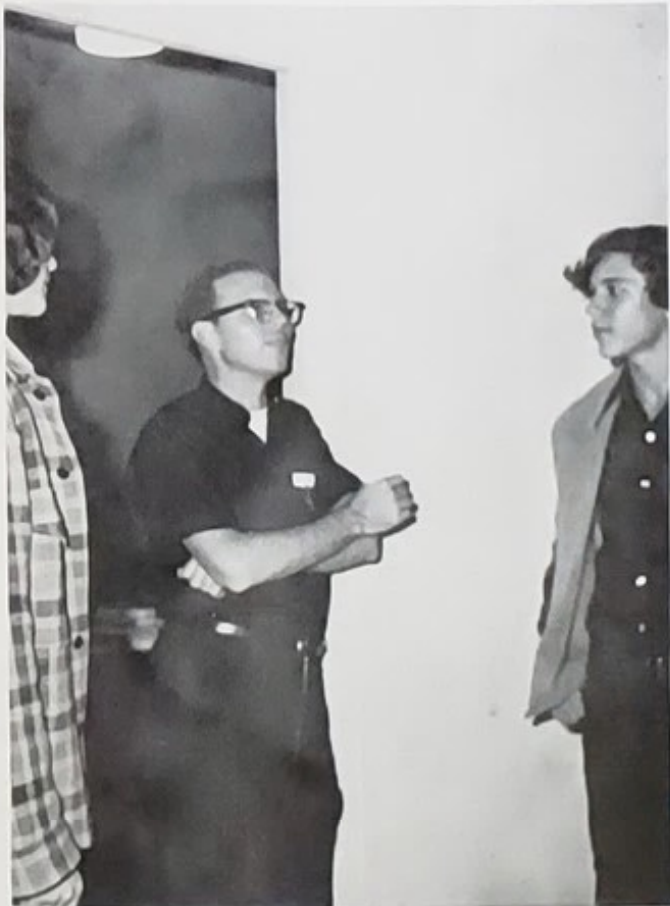


Apostolic Works

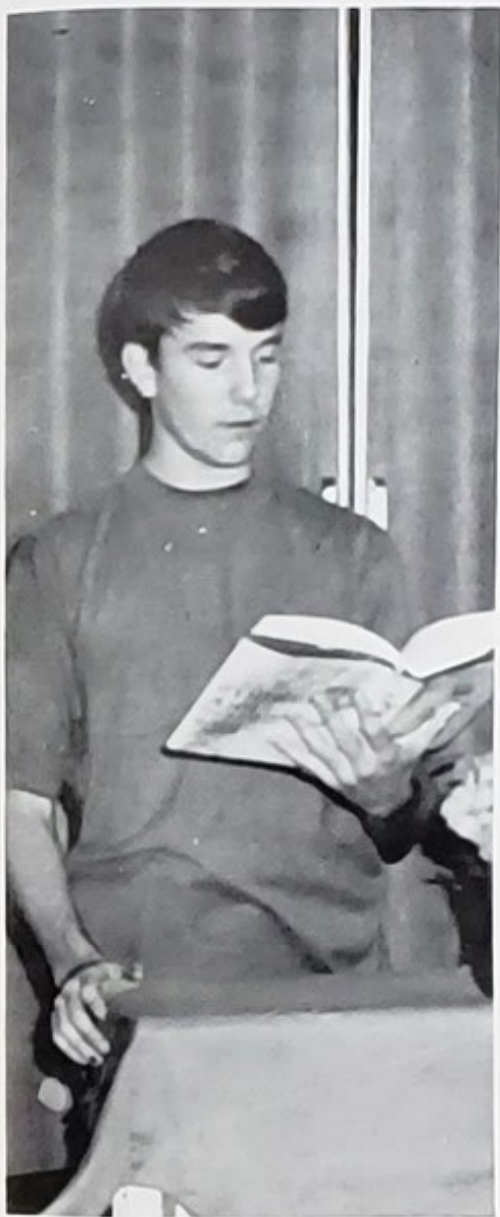
In fascination, we watched "Igor" exterminate his master.

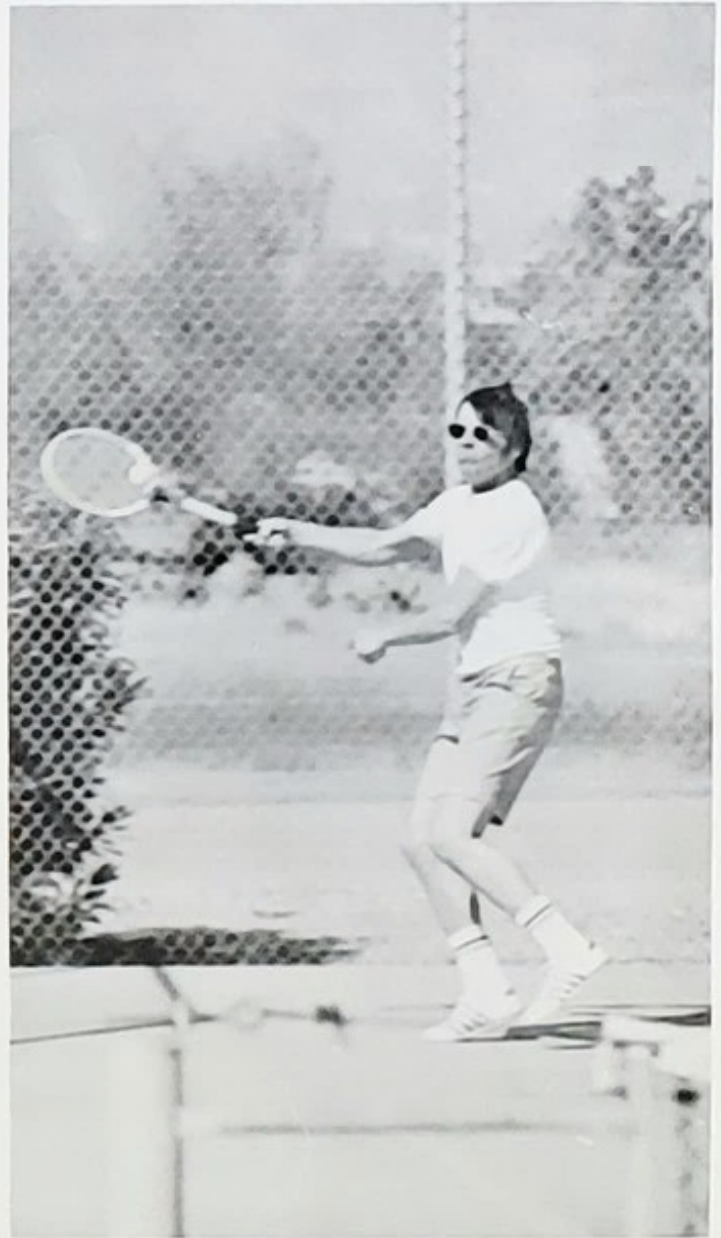
In academics, Father taught background Latin to the freshmen and sophomores. To the juniors and seniors, Father taught an interesting program in religion.
