
Our lives here have been made a little easier through these enjoy-

Days of Renewal





Apostolic Works






One part of the seminary program designed to give the student a taste of his Christian duty as an apostle of Jesus is the Apostolic Works. It is important that the student begins to realize that he has a role to play in the world and learns to recognize the need for his special talents in it.

Intending to extend the student's sphere of knowledge outside the confines of the seminary, the program incorporates diverse methods: groups of students have gone once a week to assist at Pio Decimo, a center designed to provide useful after-school recreation for children; others have assisted at the Special Olympics for retarded children; a Methodist youth group was invited here for discussion and cultural exchange.







Activities Building In an effort to give the students more recreational and activity space, the faculty opened for student use the entire Activity Building. Previously used mainly for storage, the building now contained private rooms, clubs, and activity area. The students had room for doing hobbies, working on projects, getting together for parties and chats, and storing bicycles.

Currently the major portion of rooms was occupied by a band [the Smashed Glass], a weightlifting set, a religious-goods making club, and an electronics repair shop. The main room of the building was partially used as a parking lot for student bicycles.

Weekends Home





BASKETBALL


Once again the ol'pigskin was put in moth balls giving way to the bright new basketballs.




Mrs. North is a refreshing new face here at the seminary.
